#### **Teaching Experience**

Contemporary Moral Issues- Phil 242 – A verbal intensive course with focus on understanding the varied viewpoints in many of the currently debated moral issues facing our society and development of a philosophical viewpoint on each issue. The course looked at issues such as abortion, gay marriage, torture and animal rights with emphasis on evaluation of the varied positions and identification of coherent reasons for each within a philosophical framework. Student work included evaluation of oral debate skills on ethical issues and oral presentations.

<u>Professional Responsibility</u>-Phil 244 - A writing intensive course that used a values framework to evaluate ethical behavior in professional work environments. Course

skills included learning how to evaluate an ethical dilemma and present allowable and disallowable options with philosophical reasoning to validate choices.

<u>Biomedical Ethics</u>-Phil 246– A writing intensive course that focused on the basics of medical ethics. Included evaluation of currently debated issues such as physician assisted suicide and abortion and understanding the differing philosophical viewpoints for each position. Students sharing of life experiences involving medical interactions provided a basis for discussion. Weekly reflection assignments focused on seeking a greater personal understanding or position on many difficult situations such as organ donation, egg donation, advance directives and brain death.
